

The Bond County Junior Fair Board was established to offer young adults the chance to develop leadership skills, engage in community service, and gain insight into the business and operations of the fair. Junior Members are chosen by the Fair Association Board of Directors based on their merit, character, and enthusiasm for participating in fair activities.

Eligibility for Junior Members includes being between the ages of 12 and 21, residing in or attending a school in Bond County, or being a member of a Bond County 4-H Club. During fair week, Junior Members are required to volunteer for two days at the fair. Throughout their 12-month term, they must participate in at least one fair-related event, complete a minimum of 10 hours of service,

and attend all Junior Fair Board meetings. Additionally, Junior Members are encouraged to attend regular Fair Board meetings and present ideas to the Board of Directors.

In January 2025, an 18-member Junior Fair Board was selected. Under the guidance of chairpersons from the Fair Board, the Junior Fair Board elected a President, Vice President, and Secretary.

The future of the Junior Fair Board looks bright, as the dedication and enthusiasm of its members continue to drive positive change and innovation. With their commitment to leadership and community service, the Junior Fair Board is well-positioned to make a lasting impact on the fair and the broader community.

Interpretation

Interpretation of the rules and regulations is the responsibility of the Executive Board of this Association. Persons and those seeking privileges must agree to abideFF by the rules and the Associations' interpretation of them. Any violations will automatically bar the person from the privileges stated in this premium list. All exhibitors must comply with the rules of the Department of Agriculture as the State of Illinois recommends.

Police

Individuals with valuable equipment and stock on the grounds must realize that due to the nature of the crowds and the occasion, they should at all times exert caution in protecting their property.

Parking

Patrons, entertainers, concessionaires and exhibitors are provided with parking and trailer space. Campers and trailers will be charged a fee. Fair officials have entire control over parking arrangements. Difficulty and inconveniences will be avoided by first seeking their advice before establishing living quarters. Caution your dealers about this or they may find themselves blocked from the concession area by the grounds police.

Drugs

No drugs are to be sold on the grounds.

Morals

All indecent shows or actions are forbidden.

Telephone

Please do not ask to use the office phone.

Animals

All animals must be under control at all times. Vicious animals should not be penned or tied so that children or unwary persons might get within their reach. Any evidence of carelessness in the control of animals will make the owners and caretakers liable to expulsion from the grounds with privileges evoked. No dogs allowed on midway or in parade and if on grounds must be on leash at all times and attended at all times or in cage, except for seeing eye dogs.

Superintendents

Superintendents have full control over their departments, except for rules stated in this book.

Concessions

Concessions and concessionaires are under the supervision of the Secretary of the fair who is given full authority in locating concessions, answering questions and interpreting the rules herein stated.

- 1. Concessionaires must confine their activities to their allotted space.
- 2. Any violations of contract will bar the concessionaire from the privileges of same.
- 3. Each concessionaire will receive concession passes. It is not the Association's policy to allow anyone free admission to the grounds on their own word that they work for a concession.
- 4. Each stand or exhibit is required to pay for its own wiring, which wiring will be under the supervision of the Association. Any evidence of unsafe wiring will require the closing down of the concession until safety measures are taken.
- 5. Deliveries to stands should be completed by 10:00 AM. Caution your dealers about this or they may find themselves blocked from the concession area.

Entries

- 1. SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS ARE REQUIRED WHEN NECESSARY.
- 2. Those making entries in this fair should consult their department premium lists and rules in addition to reading these regulations
- 3. ENTRIES ARE DUE JULY 25, 2024.
- 4. Entry forms are available on Page 143 or online at www.bondcofair.com.
- 5. Do not send checks/money with entries.
- 6. A separate check for each exhibitor is required.
- 7. Separate entry blanks should be used for each department in which the exhibitor makes

entries.

- 8. All animals exhibited must be the property of and registered in the name of the exhibitor. Papers must be kept on the fairgrounds at all times. Exhibitors shall be prepared to furnish registration papers on all entries upon request of superintendent.
- 9. Only two entries per class will be paid.
- 10. All livestock must be in place as stated in their department rules.

Livestock

- 1. Each exhibitor must purchase an Exhibitor Pass. Passes are good for one person only. Extra passes are available at \$10 each for exhibitors only.
- 2. All animals occupying stalls will necessitate the paying of a pen rent regardless of whether they are entered in any classes.
- 3. Community Building Exhibitors See your Department rules.

Conduct In Barns

- 1. All exhibits will be assigned stalls or pens by the superintendent.
- 2. Livestock barns must be kept in order by the exhibitors. Bring wheelbarrow to haul manure to back of barns. Feed and bedding as well as personal items should be neatly placed so as to leave clear passageways that will invite patrons to pass through and see the livestock.
- 3. See health regulations.
- 4. Superintendents or persons designated by them are responsible for deciding whether entries are being made in the proper classes.
- 5. Registered stock may not be entered in grade classes and vice versa.
- 6. Exhibitors are required to lead animals as the superintendent directs.
- 7. The judges at this fair are competent in their fields and owe no favoritism to anyone. Therefore, exhibitors are cautioned to state their questions in a reasonable manner and without abusive language.

- 8. No premiums will be awarded on animals or articles which the judges deem unworthy.
- 9. Should the death of any animal occur on the grounds, the owner or handler must remove it immediately.
- 10. Any articles or stock left on the fair grounds that is not claimed before August 9 becomes the property of the association.
- 11. Bring your own watering buckets as state law prohibits watering from troughs, except own troughs.
- 12. Any exhibitor who is guilty of acts of indecency, profanity, misconduct or failure to keep pens, livestock and equipment clean and neat may forfeit all premiums.
- 13. Association has the right to reject any exhibit that arrives late.
- 14. All exhibits must be on the grounds at specified times for their Department.

- 15. No tying out of cattle until after 9:00 PM.
- 16. All lights in livestock barns must be left on until 10:00 PM.

Cancellation

The Association reserves the right to cancel any events and premiums in case of a calamity or any unavoidable circumstances which make such action advisable in the opinion of the directors.

Premiums

(Paid subject to state funding.)

- 1. Livestock will be released after checks are issued. Depts. J-K-L-M-O and P can be picked up at time of release.
- 2. Exhibitors must sign a receipt before receiving their premium checks. Your signature or that of your agent on the receipt releases the association from any further obligation to pay premiums. If the exhibitor

leaves the fair without collecting or providing for the collection of his premiums, he cannot expect to be paid, as we need a signed receipt. No checks mailed.

All premiums uncalled for thirty days after the fair or premium checks not cashed by that date, shall be deemed donations to the fair.

3. A protest on an award must be made in writing accompanied by an affidavit setting forth the grounds for protesting the award and a deposit of \$50.00 accompanying the protest. In the event of the protest being sustained, the \$50.00 will be returned to the complainant. If the protest is not sustained, the \$50.00 shall be forfeited to the Association.

"The Department of Agriculture shall use its best efforts to secure sufficient appropriations to fund premiums. In any year for which the General Assembly of the State of Illinois fails to make an appropriation sufficient to pay such premiums, premium amounts may not be accurately reflected in this Premium Book."

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

These Exhibition Health Requirements apply to all livestock present at the fair including those animals that are not entered in competitive events.

1. Exhibitors are required to familiarize themselves with all rules applicable to their exhibits.

All out-of-state animals shall require an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.

2. All animals, except as noted, shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) which shows that the animal meets all health requirements for the State of Illinois. CVI's shall be made available to Bureau of Animal Health Personnel on request. If an official electronic CVI is utilized, the exhibitor should be able to log on and show Bureau of

Animal Health Personnel the completed CVI.

CVI means a legible record made on an official form from the state of origin which has been issued, signed and dated by an accredited veterinarian and which shows the name and address of the animal's owner or exhibitor and the results of all required tests or vaccinations. A CVI shall list only one animal identification per line; shall be presented on the form on which it was initially issued; and shall not be corrected, changed or altered in any manner.

3. All animals shall be officially identified. The animal(s) official identification shall be recorded on the CVI.

Animal identification number (AIN): A numbering system for the official identification of individual animals in the United States that provides a nationally unique identification number for each animal. The AIN consists of 15 digits, with the first 3 being the country code (840 for the United States or a unique country code for any U.S. territory that has

such a code and elects to use it in place of the 840 code).

- 4. If animals are from tuberculosis accredited, brucellosis certified, pseudorabies qualified, or brucellosis validated herds, the identifying herd number(s) along with the date of the last herd test(s) shall appear on the CVI.
- 5. CVIs for out-of-state livestock shall be void thirty (30) days after issuance.
- 6. CVIs for Illinois-origin livestock shall be void ninety (90) days after issuance.
- 7. All livestock shall be subject to examination upon entry to any Illinois fair or exhibition. Any animal showing evidence of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases shall be immediately withdrawn and held in quarantine at the owner's risk and expense until properly treated and recovered, or until the animal is released to return to the owner's premise.

Any livestock infected with scabies, mange, active lesions of ringworm, soremouth, or multiple warts which are easily visible without close examination shall not be permitted to exhibit and are subject to quarantine or removal from the fairgrounds.

Sheep and goats with caseous lymphadenitis as evidenced by draining abscesses shall not be exhibited and are subject to immediate quarantine or removal from the fairgrounds.

In the event of the suspicion of or diagnosis of a foreign animal disease, emerging animal disease, or other actionable disease, animals may be subject to quarantine on the fairgrounds until such time that it is determined that the disease is no longer a threat.

8. Illinois Department of Agriculture personnel or designee may collect blood, tissue, milk or urine samples from any animal being exhibited and/or raced at any Illinois fair to test for the presence of illegal drugs or banned substances. Examination techniques, such as ultrasound, may also be used at anytime while the animals are on the grounds of any Illinois fair or exhibit.

The Illinois Department of Agriculture or designee may collect urine, blood, tissue or other test samples from exhibition animals at the time of slaughter.

9. All exhibitors of animals at any Illinois fair or exhibition shall comply with the provisions of the Illinois Humane Care for Animals Act. If violations are observed, the animals(s) will be excused from exhibition and ordered removed from the grounds with all awards being forfeited.

Any practice or deviation from normal, accepted care, including physical, medical or mechanical application, shall constitute a violation of show rules and may result in the animal(s) disqualification and removal from the fairgrounds.

10. Any Illinois cattle, bison, cervidae or goats being exhibited in non-accredited free states must be isolated from the remainder of the herd/flock upon return to Illinois and retested for tuberculosis 60-120 days postentry.

CATTLE

Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be by a USDA official animal identification

number ear tag, ("840" tag). The identification tag must be able to be read both visually and electronically.

Illinois Cattle

Brucellosis

Illinois is a Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois cattle.

Tuberculosis

Illinois is an Accredited Tuberculosis- Free State. Tuberculin testing is not required for Illinois cattle.

Please note: Illinois calves under 6 months of age are not required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

Out-of-State-Cattle

All out-of-state cattle are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.

Brucellosis

- 1. Female cattle six (6) months of age and older and bulls eighteen (18) months of age and older shall be negative to an official test for brucellosis within thirty (30) days prior to entry, unless exempt by one (1) of the following:
 - A. Originate directly from a certified brucellosis-free herd.
 - B. Official vaccinates of dairy breeds under twenty (20) months of age or official vaccinates of beef breeds under twenty-four (24) months of age.
 - C. Animal originated from a "Class Free" state (if entire state is so classified)
 - D. Steers and spayed heifers are not required to be tested for brucellosis.
- 2. The negative brucellosis test shall be conducted at a state or federal laboratory within 30 days prior to exhibition.

Tuberculosis

- 1. Accredited Tuberculosis Free States
 - A. No tuberculin test required. All cattle, including steers, originating from an Accredited Tuberculosis Free State, may enter Illinois for exhibition when accompanied by a CVI issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days.

- 2. Non-Accredited Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
 - A. Cattle must originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past year.
 - B. The individual animals entering Illinois must be negative to an additional tuberculin test conducted within 30 days prior to exhibition.
 - C. Cattle that enter Illinois for exhibition and remain in Illinois (animal does not return to the state of origin within 30 days) must be isolated and retested for TB 60-120 days from the last official TB test date.

All Dairy Cattle (In-State and Out-of-State)

A rRT-PCR test for Influenza A virus (IAV) on milk from lactating dairy cattle exhibiting at the county fair shall be conducted prior to livestock arriving on the fairgrounds. The animals must be sampled no more than seven (7) days prior to the date of arrival and a negative test record must be presented to Department or county fair staff upon request.

SWINE

Illinois Swine

Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be by a USDA official animal identification number ear tag, ("840" tag). The identification tag must be able to be read both visually and electronically.

Brucellosis

Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois swine.

Pseudorabies

Pseudorabies testing is not required for Illinois swine.

Out-of-State Swine

All out-of-state swine are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.

Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be by a USDA official animal identification number ear tag, ("840" tag). The identification tag must be able to be read both visually and electronically.

Brucellosis

- 1. Breeding swine 4 months of age and older shall be negative to an official test for brucellosis within 30 days prior to exhibition unless exempt by one (1) of the following:
 - A. Originate immediately and directly from a validated brucellosis-free herd.
 - B. Originate directly from a validated brucellosis-free state.
- 2. Swine brucellosis tests for exhibition shall be conducted at a state or federal laboratory.

Pseudorabies

- 1. Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage IV or V state are exempt from the pseudorabies testing requirement.
- 2. Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage III state shall be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within thirty (30) days prior to entry or originate immediately and directly from a qualified pseudorabies negative herd.
- 3. Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage I or II state shall be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within the 10 days prior to entry.
- 4. Barrows and females in market classes must meet the same requirements as breeding swine.

SHEEP

Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be by an ear tattoo or official metal or plastic tag. A microchip ID is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.

Ear tattoos may be used when a registration certificate, listing the tattoo number, accompanies the animal.

When using ear tags, the tag must indicate the premises ID and state of origin. The tag number must be assigned by a state or APHIS representative and recorded in the Scrapie Record Database.

Market Lambs

All market lambs must be slick shorn (show ring ready) before weigh-in so that show lamb fungus can be identified.

Illinois Sheep

- 1. Sheep originating from a flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved flock plan.
- 2. The CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

Out-of-State Sheep

All out-of-state sheep are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.

- 1. Sheep originating from a flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved flock plan.
- 2. The CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

GOATS

Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be by an ear tattoo or official metal or plastic tag. A microchip ID is acceptable if the owner provides the reader.

Tattoos may be used when a registration certificate, listing the tattoo number, accompanies the animal.

When using ear tags, the tag must indicate the premises ID and state of origin. The tag number must be assigned by a state or APHIS representative and recorded in the Scrapie Record Database.

Ears should be used for tattooing when possible. If there is no space in the ear, the flank or tail fold may be used.

Illinois Goats

- 1. Goats originating from a herd that has previously been classified as either an infected or source herd can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved herd plan.
- 2. The CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

Out-of-State Goats

All out-of-state goats are to be accompanied

by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.

- 1. Goats originating from a herd that has previously been classified as either an infected or source herd can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved herd plan.
- 2. Tuberculosis- Goats from areas or states that are not Accredited Bovine Tuberculosis Free, must be accompanied by a CVI indicating that the goats originated from a herd where a complete negative herd test has been conducted within the past twelve (12) months and the individual animals are negative to a tuberculin test conducted within thirty (30) days prior to entry. The CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

HORSES, PONIES, MULES AND OTHER EQUIDAE

Illinois Equine

- 1. All horses and other equidae, twelve (12) months of age and older attending an advertised equine event, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) conducted within the last twelve (12) months. A copy of this test shall accompany the animal.
- 2. AGID (Coggins) or ELISA tests are accepted.
- 3. An advertised equine event means a show, rodeo, sale, auction, exhibition, trail ride, or horse fair that is posted or media promoted.
- 4. A CVI is not required for Illinois equine.

Out-of-State Equine

All out-of-state equine are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.

1. All horses and other equidae entering Illinois that are twelve (12) months of age or

older, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) conducted within the last twelve

(12) months. A copy of this test shall accompany the animal.

- 2. AGID (Coggins) or ELISA tests are accepted.
- 3. All horses and other equidae shall be accompanied by a CVI issued within thirty (30) days prior to entry.

POULTRY

- 1. All entries (except waterfowl, i.e. domesticated fowl that normally swim, such as ducks and geese) in a show or exhibition shall have originated from a U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or equivalent hatchery or flock OR have a negative pullorum-typhoid test within 90 days prior to exhibition. Exhibitor shall show proper information as to name and address of owner or exhibitor, name and address of the authorized testing agent, date of the testing and the number, breed, and species of those tested.
- 2. Prior to being used to transport poultry to a show, all crates, boxes, containers and vehicles shall be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected.
- 3. Any poultry vaccinations must be performed at least 4 weeks prior to delivery to the show.
- 4. Upon admission to a show, all entries shall be examined by the official county fair veterinarian or qualified state personnel who shall also receive and examine all certificates necessary for admission of birds to a show. Birds not in show condition will be excused from exhibition and removed from the premises. Any fowl showing signs of illness during the fair will be removed from the exhibition grounds.
- 5. All out-of-state turkeys must originate from flocks that are officially classified as U.S. Mycoplasma Gallisepticum Clean in accordance with the provisions of the National Poultry Improvement Plan or be negative to a test for Mycoplasma gallisepticum within 30 days prior to entry.
- 6. A permit is also required for outof-state poultry. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx.

CERVIDAE

(Deer, Elk, Reindeer, Caribou, Moose, Red Deer and other Related Species)

Identification

All animals shall be individually identified

with an approved tag, microchip or tattoo. Elk are required to have two official/approved unique identifiers.

Illinois Cervidae

Chronic Wasting Disease

For cervidae changing ownership or moving within the State, the owner must obtain a permit issued by the Department prior to movement and the cervid must originate from a herd that is enrolled in the Certified Monitored Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) Program or the Contained Monitored Chronic Wasting Disease Program. The permit shall be obtained no more than 72 hours in advance of the movement of the cervids by providing the following information:

- A) Name and complete mailing address of person exhibiting the cervids;
- B) Certified Monitored Chronic Wasting Disease or Contained Monitored Chronic Wasting Disease Herd number;
- C) Name and complete mailing address of location where the animals will be exhibited;
- D) Number of animals and unique identification of the animals.

Tuberculosis

Illinois is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. Tuberculin test is not required for Illinois cervidae.

Out-of-State Cervidae

Chronic Wasting Disease

- 1. All cervidae entering Illinois must be in compliance with the Illinois Wildlife Code [520 ILCS 5]. For more information, contact the Illinois Department of Natural Resources at 217/782-6384.
- 2. All cervidae entering Illinois must be accompanied by a permit from the Department and a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection that:
 - a. has been issued by an accredited veterinarian of the state of origin or a veterinarian in the employ of the United States Department of Agriculture;
 - b. is approved by the Animal Health Official of the state of origin;
 - c. shows that the cervidae are free from visible evidence of any contagious, infectious or communicable disease or exposure thereto, do not originate from a CWD endemic area (any county and surrounding counties where CWD has been

diagnosed in the past five years);

- d. shows that the cervidae are not originating from a herd under quarantine for any contagious, infectious or communicable disease:
- e. shows that the animals originate from a herd that has been monitored for at least 5 years under a state-approved CWD certification program.
- 3. A permit number can be obtained by applying online at https://www2.illinois.gov/sites/agr/Animals/AnimalHealth/Documents/permitrequestform.pdf. Applicant for permit shall furnish the following information to the Department:
 - a. Name and post office mailing address of Illinois destination;
 - b. Name and post office mailing address of the consignor and/or source herds;
 - c. Name and post office mailing address of the herd veterinarian;
 - d. Number and unique identification of cervidae in shipment.

Brucellosis

Cervidae six (6) months of age and older must have a negative brucellosis card or PCFIA test within sixty (60) days prior to entry.

Tuberculosis

- 1. Accredited Tuberculosis Free States All cervidae twelve (12) months of age and over shall be negative to two (2) single cervical tests for bovine TB no less than ninety (90) days apart with the second test conducted within ninety (90) days prior to entry. These animals shall be isolated from all other members of the herd during the testing period unless they originate from an accredited, qualified or monitored herd.
 - A. Cervidae from an accredited herd may be moved into Illinois without further TB testing provided that a certificate stating that such cervids originated from an accredited herd accompanies them.
 - B. Cervidae originating from qualified or monitored herds may enter with a negative test within ninety (90) days prior to entry and a certificate stating that the animals originate from a monitored herd.
- 2. Non-Accredited Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)

- A. All cervidae shall originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past year.
- B. The individual animals entering Illinois must be negative to two (2) additional tuberculin tests conducted within 180 and 30 days prior to entry or exhibition.

RATITES

(Ostriches, Emus, Rheas, Cassowaries and Kiwis)

Illinois Ratites

There are no requirements governing the movement of ratites within Illinois.

Out-of-State Ratites

- 1. Must be accompanied by a CVI and permit number. Entry permits are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx
- 2. Individually identified by leg band or microchip.
- 3. Negative test for Avian Influenza within 10 days prior to entry.

PIGEONS

There are no requirements governing the movements of pigeons within or into Illinois.

RABBITS

There are no requirements governing the movements of rabbits within or into Illinois.

LLAMAS

There are no requirements governing the movement of llamas within Illinois. A permit and health certificate is required for out-of-state llamas. Entry permit numbers are available online at https://entrypermit.agr.illinois.gov/Login.aspx

GENERAL RULES - JUNIOR LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENT

No premium checks will be issued without the exhibitor's social security number.

Anyone showing in the Junior class must be 8 years old or in the 3rd grade and not yet 21 years of age on or before Sept. 1 of the year previous to the fair. The Junior Show is open to all juniors.

All animals exhibited must be the property of and registered in the name of the exhibitor and kept on the grounds at all times and available to the Superintendent upon request. All classes must be shown and judged in the ring to qualify. Any exhibitor failing to comply with this regulation will be disqualified.

If animals are shown in the open class, as well as in the Junior Show, they must be shown in the same name.

Exhibits are limited to 2 entries in each class, except group class in beef is limited to 1 entry. Any exhibitor in the Junior Department who is guilty of acts of indecency, profanity, misconduct, or failure to keep pens, livestock and equipment clean and neat must forfeit all premiums in this class.

See health requirements governing exhibits in this department.

No stall rent due if the exhibitor has paid stall rent in open class for each animal.

Pick up checks at the office. Receipts must be signed.

Market animals need not be registered, but must meet all health requirements as other classes.

Any animal entered in a group must be entered in a single class.

All animals exhibited in Junior Show must be led by a junior showman.

The Superintendent reserves the right to fill classes.

OVERALL DEMOLITION DERBY RULES

READ THESE RULES CAREFULLY

Must be checked in 30 minutes prior to start time.

- Driver's Entry and Fees—Drivers must be 16 years of age or older and have a valid driver license or photo ID. Drivers 16 and 17 years of age must have a notarized consent form from both parents or legal guardians present and sign a minor release form.
- All persons MUST sign an entry form, insurance waiver, release form, pay entry fees and purchase a pit pass before entering the pit area.
- Entries will be accepted up to one hour prior to the advertised start of the derby. All trophies and earnings must be picked up at the competition of the event or you will forfeit your prize. They will not be available at a later date.
- You must have a 12" x 18" sign with your number on it. The exception is for compacts that must have a 12" x 12" sign with your number on it. THIS IS MANDATORY
- IF IT DOES NOT SAY YOU CAN DO IT, THEN YOU CANNOT DO IT. If it is questionable, then call first.
- All drivers must attend drivers meetings

prior to the derby.

- No harassing of the judges will be allowed at any time by drivers, passengers, crew members, or spectators. Failure to abide by these rules, the driver will forfeit all money, and all involved will be escorted from the premises.
- DECISION OF OFFICIALS IS FINAL! SAFETY IS OUR FIRST PRIORITY!
- Unsportsmanlike conduct will be tolerated and will be grounds for disqualification. MANAGEMENT THE RIGHT TO DISQUALIFY A CAR/ DRIVER AT ANY TIME! Any person in the pit or track area causing trouble and not obeying the rules will be asked to leave the area immediately. We can and will have police escort you out and/or have you arrested. You may also be banned from running in any future fair events. The officials have the right to inspect a car at any time including after the race. If anything is found to be illegal, you will forfeit all prizes which will then go to the next person in line. If anything is changed on your car after inspection to make your car illegal, you will be automatically disqualified and will not receive a refund of entry.
- All cars must be removed from the derby site by 12:00 Noon the following day unless otherwise stated at the drivers meeting.
 Failure to do this will result in cars being removed.

- NO REFUNDS WILL BE MADE DUE TO FAILURE TO MEET REGULATIONS!
- Top 5 in feature must actively compete at the end. There is no driving yourself on barriers or dirt berms. Failure to comply could result in complete restart with all feature qualifiers actively competing again.
- No reinforcements allowed other than specified below. Any metal added to reinforce your car is illegal. You will only be allowed two trips through the inspection line.
- NO PAINTING, UNDERCOATING, OILING, OR GREASING OF FRAMES. YOU WILL NOT BE INSPECTED. THIS INCLUDES PAINTING OF THE FRAME FLAT BLACK.
- NO HITTING IN DRIVER'S DOOR, but no using the driver's door as a shield. If the hit is deemed by the officials to be careless or intentional, you will be disqualified. If you use your driver's door as a defense, we will not enforce the rule. If you use the door as a defense repeatedly, you will be disqualified. This will be at the judge's discretion.
- NO hot-rodding in the pits. Keep it at an idle.
- Any open door or second fire will cause disqualification. If in a heat, you may fix it and come back into the consolation. In the feature, you will be disqualified.

- You must make AGGRESSIVE contact every 60 seconds.
- Sandbagging is not tolerated and will be strictly enforced. Locking up the brakes prior to a hit for anything other than a driver's door will be cause for disqualification. The fans pay to see a show—put one on for them!
- IF YOU THINK SOMEONE IS SANDBAGGING, HIT THEIR CAR WITH YOUR CAR ON THE TRACK.
- Winning cars plus 3 out of the money must remain on the track until released by the officials.
- Any questions or controversies will be discussed at the drivers meeting.
- DO NOT paint anywhere on the suspension or frame. If we can tell it's been painted, we will not even inspect your car.
- All drivers must wear an approved DOT helmet and the strap must be fastened.
- All drivers must wear eye protection, either safety glasses or a visor on helmet.
- All drivers must wear long pants and shirts.
- All drivers and riders must wear working seat belts. This will be enforced or you will not run!
- A driver that receives a black flag for an intentional door hit will be disqualified from all
- competition for the night. A driver that receives a black flag for sandbagging or one fire in the interior of the car will be disqualified, or 2 fires on the exterior will be disqualified. If in a heat, you may go to the consolation. This will be at the judge's discretion.
- ALL CARS MUST BE THROUGH CHECK-IN WITHIN 30 MINUTES OF THE START TIME OF THE DERBY AND PASSED INSPECTION, OR YOU WILL BE LOADED AND NO REFUNDS GIVEN!
- You will be given 1 chance back through inspection after your initial tech to correct what judges fine wrong with your car.
- ALL JUDGES DECISION ARE FINAL.
- The officiating team reserves the right to update and change rules as needed for safety and fairness at any point.

LIMITED WELD

- 1. Any year car allowed, except for the following: no imperials, trucks, vans, hearses, or El Caminos. All glass/ plastic/ fiberglass/ interior must be removed, and cars swept clean.
- 2. NO WELDING ON ANY KIND ANYWHERE ON THE CAR other than were stated in the rules. NO EXCEPTIONS! #9 wire can only go around the frame in 4 spots. (Up to 3 wraps in one location is OK. No more than 3 loops. Otherwise, unlimited.)
- 3. DRIVERS SAFETY: Driver's safety is our priority. Any car not deemed to be safe by officials will not run. Must have wire, chain, or car from roof to dash in front to keep the hood from coming into the driver compartment. This cannot be more than 3" past the window opening. You may also have 1 on the back window but may not go more than 4" past the window opening.
- 4. CAGE: You may have a 6-point cage. This is two side bars and 3 cross bars. The cross bars must be one in the dash area, one DIRECTLY behind drivers' seat, and the third bar may touch the package tray but cannot be pressured in. You may have 4 down tubes attached to the frame, no further forward than 2 inches in front of the rear fender well (door seam is the ending point of side bars). A halo bar is recommended. If a halo is attached to the frame, that counts as 2 down tubes. Down tubes may only be 2"x3" and attached to the top frame only.
- 5. BODY: No welding of body to frame
- 6. BODY MOUNTS: Original body mount spacers may be replaced with no larger than 3/4" all thread. Plates may only be 3"x3". Must be able to loosen the bottom for inspection of the boxes. Washers cannot be welded to body mount holes and spacers cannot be welded down.
- 7. RADIATORS: Any radiator allowed. Radiator guards are allowed. No C channel or angle iron at the bottom of the core support NO REINFORCEMENT. You may lengthen the core support to fit radiator in but you may only use 1/8th inch metal with no more than a 2 inch over lap
- 8. HOOD: May be chained or wired shut. You may use 1" all thread in two places. The other 4 pieces of all thread in the hood can only be 3/4" and must be sheet metal to sheet metal. The two in the front may go through the frame, but not in front of the radiator.

- Must have 2 holes a minimum of 6 inches in diameter on each side of the carburetor. You may use a total of 20 bolts no bigger than 3/8" and washers no bigger than 1" in the hood. Hood plates no bigger than 6"x6". If using angle, then you can not be longer than 6 inches.
- 9. TRUNK: May be chained or wired shut. You may use 2 all-thread no bigger than 1" with washers no bigger than 6" outside diameter. All thread may come through the frame in the trunk. Must go through factory body mount holes. May weld five on five only in the factory location, no welding to the truck pan. You may wedge the trunk, but only from the rear of the back of the passenger door to the bumper. You may have a rear window bar but it must be sheet metal to sheet metal.
- 10. DOORS: Must be chained, wired, or welded. You may weld solid with no straps bigger than 3" wide and 1/8" thick on the outside only. Wagon gates may be chained or wired in four spots or welded 5 on 5 off. No double plating of doors.
- 11. FIREWALL: Firewall may be cut.
- 12. FENDERS: May be trimmed and pre-bent. You may use 10 bolts no bigger than 3/8" with washers no bigger than 1" per fender. Rear quarters will be considered fenders. Rear quarters may be pre-bent but must remain vertical. No wedged front fenders. You are allowed a 7" core support spacer.
- 13. DRIVE TRAIN: You may use any motor and any transmission in the car. Motor mounts may be welded. You may use an aftermarket motor cradle for mounting purposes only. The motor cradle may be attached to the stock motor cradle but may not be attached to the frame or support the frame in any way. Headers through the hood are ok. No distributor or motor or transmission protectors. You may use an aftermarket gas pedal. You may use 1 chain per side to secure the motor and one chain on the transmission. Shifters/ Linkage may be modified to prevent binding. Slip drive shaft allowed. OEM car rear ends allowed. You may use an 8-lug rear end. If the car was a coiled spring car, it MUST stay coiled spring. If it is a leaf spring car, it MUST stay a leaf spring with a factory set of springs. May be welded position. You may brace the rear-end. Must be factory mounting, no bracing of mounts. Pinion brakes allowed. You may have axle savers.
- 14. Tires: Any tire except what is stated. Valve stem protectors allowed. Tire inside

tire allowed. No fluid in tires, no tractor tires, no paddle tires, etc. You may weld in centers. Bead locks are allowed.

15. BUMPERS: Bumper swaps ok. You may trim bumpers. You may weld bumpers on. You may either use a bumper bracket or a 10inch bumper strap on front and rear bumpers. If you choose to not use a bumper bracket or bumper strap you can use a bumper shock on both the front and the rear bumper. No bumper shocks longer than 10 inches unless they are factory for the car. Only ONE bumper strap, bracket, or shock at the front of the frame rail and ONE at the rear of the frame rail. Loaded bumpers are allowed. Homemade bumpers are allowed no more than 14" pointy. You may push stock canisters in and weld. You may use two chains 3/8" or smaller to hold the bumper on. Chains may only overlap frames by 12". No more than a 14" pointy. You may use 1 10" bumper strap per rail 1/4" thick. You may not have a front bumper height more than 28" to the top. This is the maximum and will be enforced.

16. FRAME: Notching/dimpling the frame is ok. Chain (no bigger than 5/16") or #9 wire (no more than 3 loops) from one side to the other in the rear is ok. This will not count towards the wire around the frame in 4 spots. You may re-stub but only with factory stub. Butt weld with a 2" wide strap, 2 sides of frame. Anything else done to the frame is not permitted. You may weld two beads of weld no wider than 1/2" top and bottom of the frame, but only in front of the A arm. Frame must remain 1" in front of front body mounts. You can only have 14 inches of weld per frame rail for tilting purposes. You can only tilt in 1 place. You may use six 4x4 1/4" thick plates. These plates must remain a 4 x 4 if you cut the plate down you cannot weld what you cut off somewhere else. No stubbing of 03' to any other year cars. Must have 1 inch between welds on plates, weld beads can only be 1/2 inch wide.

17. STEERING AND SUSPENSION: You may change out the steering column. You may shorten or lengthen trailing arms with no more than 1" of overlap (no reinforcing). Any upper or lower trailing arm is allowed to run – trailing arms may not be welded in place. You may reinforce tire rods. Must keep factory ends. You may run 1 bolt through factory A arm to hold down to the frame. You may use 2" x 4" straps to hold A-arms down (two per side). You may bend the ends of your sway bar or bolt or weld down, but you CANNOT WELD TO FRAME RAILS. Must be bolted to the factory location. NO SKI SPRINGS! MUST BE OEM SPRINGS

FOR CLASS! 18. WATTS LINK: 98 up WATTS Links conversion will be allowed only in the following way! The upper trailing arm bracket must be bolted in. They must be 2 separate brackets. May not be larger than 6"x 12"x 3/8" MAX. Four 5/8" bolts, nuts, and 8 washers per bracket. Brackets may only be bolted to the package tray and bolts may not stick through the body. Brackets may not strengthen the frame or body. NO WELDING AT ALL OF UPPER BRACKETS! 98 Up WATTS link lower bracket conversion. Only one way will be allowed to mount the lower trailing arm bracket. 1 piece of square tubing 3"x 3" x 3/8" x 3" long max per side of frame may be used. Cut the square tube to make a C-channel. It must be welded to the end board of the frame at the point you want your trailing arm mounted. Drill your hole through the tube and only 1" thickness of the frame. Bolt your arm into place. No other bolts will be allowed to mount to this bracket. No factory mounting brackets will be allowed to mount the trailing arm.

- 19. GAS TANK/BATTERY: Stock gas tank must be removed. Tank must be located in the rear seat area, securely fastened and covered, all fuel lines must be ran in a safe manner. Battery must be moved into the passenger compartment and safely secured. No factory tanks and all fuel connectors must be double clamped.
- 20. FLOOR PANS: Floor pans may be patched with flat stock no thicker than 1/8". Only patch bad spots, not the whole floor pans.
- 21. BODY: No seam welding. No patching. No internal seam welding. No welding body to frame.
- 22. SAFETY BELTS AND DOT APPROVED HELMETS ARE REQUIRED! All helmets must be securely fastened. You are required to wear long pants and a shirt. It is recommended that you wear a long-sleeved shirt or fire suit.
- 23. TRANS CASES AND BELL HOUSINGS: Trans cases and bell housings are permitted but you can only use 9 wire, chain, or factory mount to fasten down. You cannot use other materials to pressure them into the cross member. Fire walls must be cut out. I am allowing for safety on transmissions breaking not for the strengthening of the car. No exterior trans braces.

'03 Rules for Limited Weld Class

24. 03's may use a Smith Metal Works cradle design but can ONLY be bolted to the A-arm brackets and your factory motor mounts. CANNOT BE WELDED IN AT ALL! 03's can only use factory steering. '03's can use any upper a-arm but lower a-arms must be factory for '03 suspension. You may use two 2 inch by 4 inch straps to hold a-arms down. 2 straps per side. You may only tilt it on one spot per rail. You may only have 14 inches of weld behind the a-arms for tilting purposes. Or if you tilt in front of the a-arms you can only have 14 inches of weld.

Bone stock Class

The stock class Demolition Derby shall be open to people who have a valid driver's license or photo ID and are 18 years of age or older. If 16 or 17 years of age, you must have notarized consent from both parents/guardians' present. All drivers will adhere to all rules and regulations.

- 1. Any year car allowed, except the following: no Imperials, trucks, vans, hearses, or El Camino. All glass/ plastic/ fiberglass/ interior must be removed, and cars swept clean.
- 2. NO WELDING OF ANY KIND ANYWHERE ON THE CAR other than where stated in the rules. No Exceptions!!! You may use #9 wire in 6 spots (2 loops per spot). No patching of frames and no stubbing of cars.
- 3. DRIVER SAFETY: Driver safety is our top priority. Any car not deemed to be safe by the officials will not run. Must have wire, chain, or bar from roof to dash in front to keep the hood from coming into the driver compartment. This cannot be more than 3" past the window opening. You may also have one on the back window but may not go more than 3" past the window opening.
- 4. CAGE: You may have a 4-point cage and one down tube per side sheet metal to the cage. Your one down tube per side must be 4 inches from the front door seam and only welded to sheet metal. Cage can touch the firewall but not go into it. NO extra down tubes. No more than 12" behind the driver's side rear door seam, and it may be welded in place. If you have a gas tank protector, it must be 3" from the package tray. You may have a halo bar.
- 5. GAS TANK/BATTERY: Stock gas tank must be removed. The tank must be located

in the rear seat area, securely fastened and covered. All fuel lines must be run in a safe manner. Battery must be moved into the passenger compartment and safely secured. No factory tanks and all fuel connections must be double clamped.

- 6. MOTORS AND TRANSMISSION: No full cradles. May weld motor mounts in. May use headers. May have the lower cradle and pulley protector. No aftermarket bell housings or cases.
- 7. BUMPERS: You may run any front bumper but no more than a 14" pointy. You have a 3 inch weld zone to attach the bumper. Must be mounted 2 inches or more in front of the 1st body mount from the front of the factory hole.
- 8. REARENDS: Can be any rear end.
- 9. SUSPENSION: Must have factory A-arms and 2 2x4 straps per Factory OEM A-Arms for that car make, model, and year. Rear coil springs CANNOT BE COLLAPSED, but CAN be wired in or bolted at the tops. The factory suspension must have movement IN THE REAR. Must have an OEM factory spring/car spring. Must be factory ball joints in factory locations.
- 10. SUSPENSION: May use spring spacers. No clamping of leaf springs. Must have factory trailing arms. Must stay factory OEM to that car.
- 11. STEERING: Must have factory tire rod ends and sleeves. NO hydro-steers.
- 12. DRIVE LINE: You may have a slide shaft.
- 13. DOORS: You may have 12" of door weld per seem. Door straps no wider than 3".
- 14. TRUNKS: You may bolt the trunk lid to sheet metal. Trunk lid may be bent at 90-degree angle ONLY.
- 15. BODY MOUNTS: You may replace body mounts with 1/2" bolts with no larger than 3" washer. You must have a 1" spacer but they cannot be welded in. You can have two 3/4" all-thread in front and two 3/4" all-thread in back. BODY must not be welded to frame in any location.
- 16. CORE SUPPORT: Core support is part of your body mount all thread, but you may leave out body mounts on core support only and you are allowed a 3 inch spacer. NO REINFORCING. 3 inch or shorter core support spacers only.

- 17. You may have a trans cooler.
- 18. ABSOLUTELY NO CREASING!!
- 19. ABSOLUTELY NO COLD TILTING OR GUSTING OF BOXES!!
- 20. TIRES: You may run Forklift tires, no full centers or solid tires. No bead locks or bead guards.
- 21. You may use no more than 15 3/8" bolts for hood or fenders.
- 22. No more than a 4" by 4" hood plate. 6 total allowed.
- 23. Repair plates for pre-ran cars, you are allowed two 4 inch by 4 inch, 1/4 inch thick plates. They must be on a bent spot only. Must be able to prove the need of the plate. Must not push down past factory spec.
- 25. Any OEM radiator. No radiator guards or expanded metal. May use old radiator or condenser.
- 26. You may run a WATTS LINK, but you can only use 4 bolts per upper bracket (2 total upper brackets allowed only) through the package tray. Lower bracket you may weld a piece of 4 x4 angle with one bolt through it to hold the trailing arm and that must be welded to the inside of the frame not cupping the frame.

Modified Compact

General:

- 1. Cars can be powered by a 4- or 6-cylinder engine.
- 2. 108" maximum wheelbase.
- 3. No shortening of cars to achieve wheelbase limits.
- 4. If 4x4 cars are used, the front or rear drive shaft must be removed.
- 5. No sedagons.
- 6. Batteries must be located in the passenger compartment. TWO batteries are allowed.
- 7. Cars MUST have working seat belts and brakes. MANDATORY!
- 8. You must pass inspection within 2 times, or you will not be allowed to run.

Body

- 9. No body seams may be welded inside the car.
- 10. No doubling of body panels allowed.
- 11. Doors may be chained, wired, or welded shut.
- 12. You must have an 8"x 8" inspection hole in trunk lid.
- 13. Rust repair is limited to floorboards and roof only. Patch metal must be same thickness as floorboard. 1" overlap to good metal outside of rust area stitch welded only. DO NOT abuse this rule or you will be cut. MUST HAVE PICTURES OF RUST REPAIR.
- 14. The front windshield bar is MANDATORY. It is limited to two 3" wide x 1/4" thick strap or a chain/ 9 wire loop.
- 15. Body creasing is ok.

Radiator and Core Support:

- 16. The radiator must be in stock position.
- 17. Any automotive type of radiator can be used. Aluminum radiators are LEGAL.
- 18. NO homemade radiators allowed.
- 19. No reserve tanks and no added cooling capacity.
- 20. Two electric fans, mounted to the radiator, may be used.
- 21. Factory core support MUST be used. No fabricated core supports.
- 22. Do not move core support.
- 23. Factory condenser or 32" wide by 1/4" thick radiator protector is allowed.

Hood

You can have ONE of the following: (6) 2" long pieces of 2"x 2" angle with a single 3/8" bolt through them OR (6) 3/4" MAX all thread, welded to sheet meatal only, 3" weld 1 side.

- 24. Hoods must have 2 holes, at least 4" in diameter on each side of the carburetor. If hood is removed, either the fan or the fan belt must be removed.
- 25. Hoods MUST open at inspection.

26. Hoods may be secured by 2 pieces of all thread through core support. 1" diameter max.

Trunk

- 27. You may use 6 pieces of all-thread to secure the trunk lid. All thread can go through rear frame or be welded to the side of the frame. If going through the frame the washers may be no larger than 3" in diameter. No sleeving all thread and no nuts directly under trunk lid.
- 28. You can have 4 pieces of #9 wire from trunk to rear bumper.
- 29. Trunk can be welded down with 3" by 1/8" thick strapping 6" on 6" off.

Cage

- 30. All cars MUST have a cage and rollover bar. 4" pipe or 4"x 4" square tubing MAX. THIS IS FOR DRIVER SAFETY.
- 31. A 4-point cage is required and limited to 4 points only. Your cage must have a dash bar that must be 3" from the firewall. Your cage must have a bar behind the driver's seat no more than 12" away from it. You must have 2 side bars and they must not be farther than the rear wheel humps and must not extend past your dash bar. The side bars must not be welded to the rear humps.
- 32. Roll over bar cannot be more than 12" behind the driver's seat. It may be welded to rear sheet metal; you may use a 6"x 6" plate 1/4" thick to aid in attaching the bar. It can be welded or bolted. Roll over bar may be bolted to the roof. Roll over bar cannot run through to frame.
- 33. The cage can be welded to sheet metal only. You can have up to four down posts, two per side. You must have a dash bar, a cross bar behind the seat and two door cross bars.
- 34. Gas tank protectors are allowed.

Frame

- 35. No welding, plating, or reinforcing of the frame, unless it is your 6- 3"x 6" plates.
- 36. ALL factory frame holes must be left open.
- 37. You can shorten the front frame only to aid in mounting the front bumper. (No shortening beyond core support)
- 38. You are allowed ONE of the following options: (A). A 10" bumper shock max 2" diameter. Bumper shock can be internal. WE

- WILL DRILL FRAME TO CHECK. or (B). 3/8" PLATE 10" long 3" tall to the side of the frame. Must attach to the bumper. If a plate is used it must be external.
- 39. You cannot "stub" or shorten the front or rear of the car body to frame.
- 40. K-Member can be bolted in with 1" all thread, NO WELDING, YOU WILL CUT

Bumpers

- 41. Any 4- or 6-cylinder engine allowed. Must be mounted within 6" of factory motor position. Engines cannot protrude into the passenger compartment before the race.
- 42. Front wheel drive cars can weld motor mounts and replace the top mounts with 2"x 2" square tube factory length. Must be in factory configuration (not to be used to strengthen the car in any way.)
- 43. Transmission oil coolers and engine oil coolers are permitted. They must be secure and contained and covered inside the car, for the driver's protection.
- 44. Slider shafts are allowed.
- 45. OEM crossmember or 2"x 2" square tube. Factory style rubber transmission mount must be used.
- 46. HOMEMADE gas pedals and shifters are allowed Gas Tank and Fuel Pump:
- 47. The stock gas tank MUST be removed from its original position and mounted in the rear seat area and secured. No rubber or chain straps. All tanks must have a secure cap. A marine tank or fuel cell is strongly recommended. All lines and fitting must be leak proof and meet approval of the track officials. Electric fuel pumps are allowed.
- 48. All lines must be run inside the car, not along the frame underneath.
- 49. All lines should be double clamped.

Steering and Suspension:

- 50. Suspension must be original factory suspension for that car.
- 51. Aftermarket tie rods are allowed.
- 52. You cannot convert front suspension. IE: Factory strut cars must remain factory struts. Factory A-arm cars must remain factory A-arms.

- 53. You cannot convert rear suspension from coil to leaf.
- 54. Front struts can be welded solid with single bead of weld, sleeved, or aftermarket ones allowed.
- 55. A-arm cars get 4" total of strap 2" wide 1/4" thick to secure A-arms down per A-arm.
- 56. Coil spring cars may not substitute pipe or tube for spring.
- 57. Any automotive rear ends.
- 58. On leaf spring cars, no more than 5 springs are allowed per side and must be mounted in factory location with factory style hardware. You may use five spring clamps per spring. Maximum 1" wide 1/4" thick. The leafs must have a 2" stagger front and rear.
- 59. Any trailing arm allowed.
- 60. Front wheel drive cars, rear struts can be welded solid. Rear axle must be factory.

 Tire:
- 61. Black rubber and round.
- 62. Wheels, 19" max bead lock or rim guard.
- 63. Weld in centers/ Multi centers are ok.
- 64. Valve stem protectors are ok. (A) If it doesn't say you can do it, don't assume that you can. (B) ASK first or don't do it (C) No refunds will be given.

Gut and Go Compact

- 1. Mini cars must be 110" wheelbase or less.
- 2. Dash may be removed. Remove all glass, mirrors, plastic, and all decking in a wagon.
- 3. You must remove the stock gas tank if behind the rear axle. You may relocate the stock gas tank into the back seat but must be securely covered and fastened. Or you can use an after-market metal tank.
- 4. Battery may be relocated only to the front passenger floorboard and must be secured and mounted properly (1 automotive battery only).
- 5. Hood must have a 5"x 5" hole in them. No Threaded Rod
- 6. You must have the hood open for inspection

or two 5"x 5" holes.

- 7. Hood may have six (6) pieces of #9 wire two loops per hole. Trunk may have six (6) pieces of #9 wire loops two per hole. NO THREADED ROD in Hood, trunk, or Body Mounts. You can not hold down suspension with wire.
- 8. Must use 1 piece of #9 wire in windshield for safety.
- 9. Trunk must be on hinges and have a 5"x 5" hole cut in it. Or you may remove the trunk lid. NO THREADED ROD
- 10. BUMPERS: Any OEM bumper cut to width of vehicle. Can run 4 inch by 4 inch square tubing if you do not have an OEM Bumper. Must remain straight. Bumpers may be loaded. You can have 3 inches in the front and 3 inches in the back to weld the bumper on. NO MOPAR POINTY BUMPERS no aftermarket bumpers except the 4 x 4 square tube flat option.
- 11. You have a 3" weld zone to attach the bumper. Nothing beyond 3", or you will cut it! USE A TAPE! Bumper must remain in front of the core support.
- 12. Allowed 2 2x4 1/4 inch plates on a proven bend no other repairs.
- 13. Driver and Passenger front doors may be welded solid. You may use no wider than 3" wide or 1/8" thick. All other door seams are 5" on 5" off.
- 14. You may run a door plate for leg protection but it must be sheet metal to sheet metal inside the door seams. For protection only, not for making the car tougher!
- 15. You may weld factory spider gears in the rear end.
- 16. You may notch the frame, but not weld back together.
- 17. If you have a rusted out body mount you are allowed to use 1 5/16 bolt to repair must have factory rubber.
- 18. Allowed 6 #9 wire 2 loops allowed in body NO using of #9 wire to hold the suspension down.
- 19. ECM's must be under hood. NO CARB SWAPS
- 20. Push/Pull shifter allowed, and you may run push button start.

- 21. Any tire allowed on a factory wheel. No full centers and no bead locks. NO SOLID TIRES, DOUBLE TIRES, OR BEED FLAPS
- 22. Suspension must remain stock and to the brand of car.
- 23. Cage may be a 4-point cage with no down tubes. Must be at least 2" from the package tray. THE ABOVE RULES IS THE MAX YOU'RE ALLOWED TO DO. DO NOT DO ANYMORE OR YOU WON'T BE RUNNING THIS CLASS!
- 24. Repair plates for pre-ran cars, you are allowed two 3 inch by 6 inch, 1/4 inch thick plates. They must be on a bent spot only. Must be able to prove the need of the plate. Must not push down past factory spec. ALL JUDGES DECISIONS ARE FINAL!!!!!

Mini Van, Small Truck, and SUV

- 1. DASH: Dash may be removed. Remove all glass mirrors and plastic.
- 2. GAS TANK: Stock gas tank is allowed if between the axles. If not, the gas tank must be mounted inside a van. No exceptions.
- 3. HOOD: Hood must have a 5" by 5" hole cut in it to extinguish fires. Hood must be able to open for inspections. You may have 6 pieces of chain in the hood or wire in six spots.
- 4. TRUNK: Trunks remain on hinges. You may use 6 pieces of chain or 6 pieces of 9 wire to hold the trunk shut.
- 5. BUMPERS: Any OEM bumper cut to width of vehicle. Can run 4 inch by 4 inch square tubing if you do not have an OEM bumper. Must remain straight. Bumpers may be loaded. You can have 3 inches in the front and 3 inches in the back to weld the bumper on. NO MOPAR POINTY BUMPERS no aftermarket bumpers except the 4 x 4 square tube flat option.
- 6. DOORS: You may weld drivers and passenger front doors solid. All other doors must be 6 on 6 off vertical door seams only.
- 7. CAGE: You may have a 4-point cage. No more than 3 feet behind the front seat.
- 8. TIRES: Any type of tire on factory rim. No doubles, solids, or bead flaps.
- 9. REAR ENDS: Rear ends can be welded.

- 10. DRIVE TRAIN: Push pull shifters allowed. Push button start allowed. Headers are allowed with no protectors.
- 11. Repair plates for pre-ran cars, you are allowed two 3 inches by 6 inch, 1/4 inch thick plates. They must be on a bent spot only. Must be able to prove the need of the plate. Must not push down past factory spec.
- 12. NO 4 X 4 . You must remove the front drive shaft if you run a 4X4.
- 13. Suspension must remain stock, may weld shocks or top arm down with 2 straps (2 inches wide) and only 2 inches welded straight down to the frame. Spacers are allowed. No trailer hitches, spacers, blocks, air shackles. Airlifts must be deflated.
- 14. Drive Train MUST BE STOCK No V8, V10, V12, Rotary, Diesel, or Jet engines!
- 15. Unlimited #9 Wire is allowed. However, your unlimited Wire cannot be used excessively for extra weight, bulk put in the trunk pan, bulk stuffed extra in frame, or bulk used to fill body panels or bumpers the inspection judge has the final call.

PAYOUT BASED UPON PARTICIPATION

General Rules

- Only (1) person per machine during runs, regardless of manufacturer seating or ability.
- Helmets are required for all drivers.
- Seatbelts or harnesses are required.
- Toolboxes, roll bars/cages and spare tires must be fastened down. No loose objects in the back of the machine or in the driver's compartment. Machine beds must be free of trash; no loose objects.
- Goggles, safety glasses and fire retardant suits are recommended for all drivers.
- Drivers must be present for the drivers meeting.
- After registration, prior to the drivers meeting, drivers must ready their machine(s) for pre-race inspection. Machine(s) must remain in the staging area.
- Alcohol consumption, prior to the driver's final event of the day, is not permitted.
- All machines must pass inspection before entering.
- No convertibles. All machines will have either a hard top or a roll bar
- During a run, if a machine runs out of bounds, the run will be disqualified.
- All persons must pay entry fees, purchase a pit pass and sign an entry form, insurance waiver, and release form before entering the pit area.
- All machines must have an adequate working brake system.
- "Stock" simply means stock drivetrain with no modifications.
 Tires do not matter
- Bond County Fair official's calls and judgements are final.
- The Bond County Fair Board reserves the right to change this rulebook at any time.

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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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Fred Baumberger was deeply involved in the Bond County Fair, serving as both Beef & Speed Superintendent for the horse races.

Their dedication aimed to celebrate the county's agricultural heritage. A portion of their trust now supports the ongoing tradition of the Bond County Fair.

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
